Thank you to all the parents that came to support and help at this event too.



KS₁

Hedgehogs - This week in English, we have been working on writing instructions using Imperative Verbs (bossy verbs). We have looked back at our sandwich making and discovered lots of imperative verbs at the beginning of our instructions! This tied in nicely with our focus text which is 'If Your Monster Won't Go To Bed' by Denise Vega. At the end of the story, the main character gets her monster to sleep following 6 hilarious steps. After reading the book we wrote out our own bedtime routine and looked at the order that we needed to follow. We also used our knowledge of verbs, adjectives and nouns to see how the author composed a paragraph (step). The book has become a favorite in the class! Unfortunately, at the end of the story, the main character could not put zombies, werewolves or dragons to sleep and that is where we come in. Our mission for the last couple of weeks of this half-term is to write some engaging steps to get one of them to sleep... wish us luck!

Squirrels - Last week we made 'prototype' beach huts. Firstly, we looked at the features of beach huts and noticed that they all have pointy apex roofs and they don't usually have windows. We noticed that the patterns were often striped and very colourful. We used cardboard boxes and PVA glue to create our own models including these features. We focused on how to join the sections of our boxes together and experimented with different ways of strengthening the edges. Growth Mindset was a big feature of our junk modelling session. We discovered many ways of joining boxes together that didn't work and we discussed how we shouldn't struggle on with these ideas but should try something different!!

KS₂

Rabbits - What a confusing week we have had! Our topic is great fun but we don't know if we're doing topic or Science! We have really enjoyed learning about Mary Anning this week and how important she was in understanding Fossils. It seems really unfair that she wasn't allowed to be celebrated because she was a woman, but times have changed for the better. In Maths we have had lightbulb moments... adding 19 or 29 is so easy, we just had more and adjust by one and that means we can use our knowledge of the ten times table to help!

Badgers 4D - We transformed into Norse Myth characters this week; role-playing scenarios of the moment that Thor finds Loki has cut off his wife's hair (Sif) and confronts him. We have also been learning how to punctuate direct speech correctly and will be writing out the full dialogue between the two characters next week.

Badgers 4H - This week we have nailed co-ordinates. The children have learnt how to plot points on a grid and how to translate shapes across not just one but two quadrants. 4H finished up their work on this unit with a whole class Battleships Challenge which was great fun.

Foxes - To further our 'Grow, Sow and Farm' topic, Foxes went on a trip to Buddington Farm - it was amazing!

We learnt about a range of different farming processes and techniques linked to the mixed farm. Lewis, Ella's dad, guided us around the farm and explained how the dairy cows are cared for. We even saw a cow being milked by a special robot!

The farm also produces potatoes for restaurants and we learnt how to wash, sort and bag them. The forklift, that moved the potato crates around, was our favourite piece of machinery because we were able to see how it could reach the top of the warehouse roof.

We loved asking questions and exploring the different parts of the farm. At the end of the trip, we were allowed to pick a turnip to take away with us. However, the best bit was getting to try some ice-cold milk before we left!

Otters - We kicked off the week with some drama! As part of our English unit, we have been reading a letter written by an abolitionist who campaigned for the end of colonisation. On Monday, we stepped into the shoes of our characters and put them into the hotseat for an interview about slavery. We had to imagine how Maya and the King would respond, and what their thoughts might be about the end of slavery. We had great fun, even though it was quite challenging to step into role and imagine how the characters would feel.
