With Mrs Cella and Mrs Cobbold leaving, we will need some more **midday meals supervisors**. There are six lunch hours that will need an additional staff member. We will be advertising over half-term, but if you are interested in covering two or more of these, please contact the school.

Having had a positive assessment of the school's need for a crossing patrol, we are due a second 'body count'. With this in mind, can I please ask as many children as possible to **walk home** or to a locally parked car (Park & Stride) at the end of the day **on 1st November**. I know that many families drive to school because of the risk in crossing Wheelbarrow Castle, but, ironically, this weakens our case as we need to show just how much pedestrian traffic the school potentially has.

Covid cases are currently at 183 per 100,000 in the area around the school. We have been fortunate so far, but, today, we have had our third confirmed case. Please remain vigilant, encourage good hygiene and get a PCR test for any household member who develops any of the three symptoms.

NURSERY AND EYFS

So where has this half-term gone? This week, Caterpillars have been painting their spooky spiders. Ladybirds and Bumble Bees have been exploring Autumn colours and adding to their class displays. Bumble Bees have been on a Wellie Walk to collect leaves, sticks and feathers to hang on their Autumn branches. Have a great half-term everyone!





This week, the whole school attended Harvest Festival down at the church. Dragonflies teamed up with their buddies, who did a brilliant job of looking after them and holding their hands until we all got safely across the roads and into church.

ENVIRONMENT DAY

Today was Environment Day for Easebourne Primary School. The classes participated in various activities to explore a variety of environmental issues.

Year 6 have been learning about Arctic habitats (tundra and boreal forests), and made egg carton sculpture to demonstrate the environment and then wrote an acrostic poem.

Year 5 have focused on the importance of bees in our environment. They created a persuasive poster to encourage people to protect the bees.

4D learnt about climate change and what we can do to stop it. They also focused on flooding, deforestation and the greenhouse effect.

Year 3 extended their science topic from this half-term by looking at light pollution. It affects 80% of the world and is caused by excess light in the night sky. We need to try to protect the night sky by turning off the lights!

Year 2 have been learning about ways we can protect the environment and made posters to remind others about what they can do. They then went outside to collect lots of natural materials to make an autumn collage.

Year 1 kept it close to home and focused on hedgehogs as they are an endangered species. We learnt that lots of animals hibernate between November and March including hedgehogs and that they like to hibernate under log piles and leaves. Hedgehogs are under threat due to a loss of habitat and food. We found out that hedgehogs eat worms and bugs but also like dog and cat food!



KS₁

This week, Year 1's E4S has been inspired by the idea that having the confidence to 'be yourself' can have a positive impact on mental health and emotional wellbeing. The children recognised their positive qualities and appreciated their individuality. They were encouraged to recognise different emotions and explore different strategies to help them manage any uncomfortable feelings they experience. We also looked at how big life changes have an impact on feelings and emotions and explored the importance of sharing their thoughts and feelings. We looked at what makes each child different and special, recognised that not everyone feels the same feelings at the same time or feels the same about things and that some of our friends like the same things as us and some do not and that is okay.

This week, Squirrels have combined their PE and DT lessons with their science about animals including humans. We have been focusing on human bodies, what they need to stay healthy and how exercise plays a part in that. We looked at some recipes for a healthy meal, learned about pulses and root vegetables and tried a vegetable casserole that Mrs Payne made at home. In PE, we thought about how our bodies felt when they were at rest and how that changed after doing some exercise.
