## KS1

Hedgehogs have been looking at plants this week. The children looked at different root systems and completed an observational drawing. We discussed what fruit and vegetables they grow at home and what vegetables are the root of the plant. To help us take a closer look at fruit and vegetables, we did some more observational drawing using shading.

Squirrels have been busy this week in Science looking at the Habitats in our school grounds. We explored the field and tried to describe it as though we were estate agents, trying to sell the habitat to minibeasts. We also learnt that there are micro-habitats, for example a rotten tree with moss on is a micro-habitat within the forest. In RE we have been learning about the festival of Simchat Torah. We have learnt that the Torah is a very special book to the Jewish community. It takes one year to read the Torah scroll! We will be making our own Torahs to display and share with others.





Otters Class had the challenging decision of choosing a new class reader book. We had 16 books to choose from which were some of Miss Glanville's favourites. Firstly, we investigated the books in the hall and had an opportunity to look at the covers and discuss them with our friends. Through the group stages, we lost many fantastic novels (RIP!) and we now have the grand final: "The Girl Who Stole an Elephant" vs "The Last Wild". Which will triumph?

In Badgers we have been creating Egyptian art with Mrs Nixon, drawing and colouring hieroglyphics and cartouches. Hieroglyphics are the Ancient Egyptian alphabet, pictures represent the letters, sounds and words. Ancient Egyptians were good at phonics!
