

During RE we have been looking at the creation story and today we looked at the sky, clouds, and rain, combining this with a little science to explain what causes rain. The children had cups of water that were filled with shaving foam clouds. They created water droplets in the cloud using blue dye from a syringe. They noticed that the more drops they put into the cloud the heavier the water became until it was too heavy to stay suspended in the cloud, and the droplets fell as rain. The children loved the experiment! We then thought about words to describe the wonder of Creation and we made a "wordle".





It has been a fantastic, busy start to the new half-term for Squirrels Class. We are very excited to have started Forest School and our new topic 'Special people and places'! We are starting to think about who in our lives is special to us and why.
