Rabbits Class



This half-term in Rabbits Class, we have been exploring our topic on 'Rainforests'. We have spent a long time researching and writing about why the River Amazon will never dry up. We all created information texts that explain the reason why, focussing specifically on the Water Cycle (also known as the hydrologic cycle). This has been fascinating and we have learnt a lot about the way that water is moved around the Earth. It did cause us to ask why we get more rain that lots of other countries though! In maths we used the typical rainfall across the course of the year to create bar charts and we found this interesting because although it is warm in the Amazon, it rains a lot. When it is feeling warm and sticky (due to the rain) it is also called humid. Our vocabulary banks are getting bigger as there are a lot of new words in this topic, so we have become experts with a dictionary!

We have also had fun looking at all the different types of animals that inhabit the rainforest and more specifically the River Amazon. There are types of fish that we had never even heard of!

Over the course of the spring and autumn terms, we have also been learning to play the ukulele. This has been quite tricky this term as we have been learning to read tab as well as play the ukulele. We sing and play and trying to get our brains into this routine has been difficult but we have all had lots of fun, especially learning songs like 'Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star'.

Everybody in Rabbits has had great fun this term being outdoors in Forest School. During our time in the forest we have made dens, God's eyes and hair braids. For the God's eyes we had to create a cross from 2 sticks and weave wool between the wooden cross, they looked great when we used different colours to make them. We also got really dirty covering our faces with charcoal and red paint... we loved coming back into school covered in charcoal! In our last Forest School sessions we were super lucky and got to roast smores! They are so delicious!

During the spring term we have also taken part in Mindfulness lessons. We have learnt about the different parts of the brain and how they influence our decisions and the choices we make as well the way that we feel and respond to events. Being mindful can help keep us calm and relaxed. There were lots of different practices that we learnt, FOFBOC (feet on floor bottom on chair), petal practice and hand practice. We also learnt that feelings and emotions can be contagious, such as laughing. It is good to be positive and try to keep happy because if one person is happy they can help someone else to feel that way too.





Badgers Class Mindfulness

This term all classes from Year 2 to Year 6 had "Mindfulness" lessons which help us to keep the mind controlled by learning 5 practices including FOFBOC, petal practice, finger practice, PawsB and mindful eating. Sandrine, our teacher, taught us in each lesson and helped us to control our mind and emotions. We look forward to using these new skills to help us concentrate and focus our minds in the future. 
Otters Class

Cross Country Run


Inter-school MRC Cross Country Competition
