### **Paired Reading Workshop**

Parents are invited to a paired reading workshop on Wednesday 20<sup>th</sup> March at 2.45pm. Paired reading is a research-based fluency strategy used with readers who lack fluency and helps to encourage a love of reading.

Come and find out more about this simple but effective approach when reading with your child.

Paired reading - what are the advantages?

- Increased enthusiasm: children are encouraged to pursue their own interests in reading material.
- Lots of praise: pupils are told when they are doing well, instead of only errors being highlighted.

• Emphasis of understanding: not just mechanically reading, but getting the meaning out of the words on the page.

No failure: it is impossible not to get a word right within 5 seconds or so. With paired reading it is easier for children to make sensible guesses at new words, based on the meaning of the surrounding words.

- Children are encouraged to read with expression and the right pacing.
- Children are given a perfect example of how to pronounce difficult words.
- There is some evidence that just giving children more attention can actually improve their reading.

### Clubs

Please note that clubs finish for this term on Friday 22<sup>nd</sup> March with the exception of Badminton and Hockey. They will have an extra session on Wednesday 27<sup>th</sup> March to make up for the cancelled week. The new clubs list will be emailed to parents on Friday 29<sup>th</sup> March and in the interest of fairness no forms will be accepted until Monday morning. When the closing date for applications has been reached we will allocate all 1<sup>st</sup> choices where possible and then allocate 2<sup>nd</sup> choices etc until a club reaches capacity.

Please note, for Years 1 and 2 Cooking and Singing Clubs, priority will be given to those children who were on the waiting list this term <u>if</u> they put the club as their first choice for the Summer Term.

If any parents, grandparents, volunteers, governors or friends of Easebourne would be able to run or assist with a club, please let the office know.

### Scholastic Book Club

Your child should have come home with the latest Scholastic Book Club catalogue. If you wish to make an order the deadline is Friday 22<sup>nd</sup> March. For every £1.00 you spend on books, our school will earn 20p in Scholastic Rewards to purchase books for our school library.

### Uniform

The school encourages all pupils to follow the school dress code as this helps to engender a sense of belonging and pride about the school. As with other schools, we ask for parental co-operation in ensuring that pupils are suitably dressed, and that high standards regarding school uniform are maintained.

We try to ensure that there are regular opportunities for children to wear home clothes or costumes and these occasions generally raise funds for good causes.

Recently, members of staff have noticed that some children are coming to school wearing items that are not part of the school's dress code. Whilst we understand that there will occasionally be times when this is unavoidable, we would like to enlist parental support in ensuring that children come to school in uniform which adheres to the school's guidance. This includes footwear and jewellery.

There is a large amount of lost property in the school which if unclaimed by the end of term will be disposed of. Please have a look through the items in case anything belongs to your child. There is not only school uniform but home clothing too and a number of food pots.

### **Parent Request for Second Copies**

In the case of families where parents are separated or divorced, it is the school policy to provide second copies of correspondence if requested by the parent who is not the primary carer. Please provide the school with an up to date address, email and telephone number and keep us informed of any changes to the information provided. We will send:

- a newsletter fortnightly by email
