NURSERY AND EYFS

Early Days Nursery welcomes 7 new children this term. Caterpillars and Ladybirds have been reading 'Jasper's Beanstalk' and talking about growing plants. Bumble Bees have been reading and acting out 'Jack and The Beanstalk', "fi fi fo fum, I'm a giant". They've painted 5 magic beans to plant in the classroom.....will they be magic and grow after all?! Some of the children have made models and written their own name labels to display.



This week in Dragonflies our new phonics phoneme was 'or'. This also tied in with St George's Day that was at the weekend. On Monday the children dressed up as knights, princesses and dragons as they have been learning all about the story of Saint George. They have made clay dragons in class and large dragons out of the crates in the garden. They also painted pictures of dragons and made flags too.

OUR ENVIRONMENT:

With this year's new growth, the labyrinth is looking better than it ever has. The holes were plugged last term, there is lots of greenery and the hedges now have real height – we've just got to keep on top of it! You can even see it clearly on Google Maps, if you look, though I don't know how old the current image is! Our Year 5 Labyrinth Guardians have been giving it the once over this week and are now embarking on identifying the different trees that make up the hedging so that they can produce information posters to explain to everybody how to spot the different species for themselves.

KS1

Hedgehogs - Science this term is about wild and garden plants in the local environment.

We started our topic by sharing the children's ideas relating to plants, we all knew something that we could share. We investigated plants a bit further and found out that they are living things that grow, change over time and make new plants. Using an apple tree, as an example, we looked at seasonal changes. We learned a lot of new words that will help us with our understanding of plants over this half term. We took our learning outside and went on a hunt for plants using a plant identification sheet to help us. Once we had found as many plants as we could, the children then chose one plant to draw and label. Most of us could identify the stem, flower, and leaf.

Squirrels – Over the last few months we have been lucky enough to have an ex-pupil, Rebecca, helping us in class. Rebecca is training to be a Teaching Assistant and has aided the children in all areas of their work. Squirrels have enjoyed working with her because she is good at understanding why they have made mistakes and explaining how to correct them. They enjoyed reading to her and talking about their books. They also liked talking to Rebecca and listening to her stories about when she came to Easebourne, sharing her struggles at school and explaining to the children about perseverance, resilience and self-confidence. It has been a lot of fun having Rebecca to help out and we will really miss her.

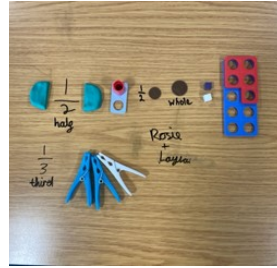

KS2

Rabbits - We have had a great start to the new term and have welcomed Mya to our burrow! We are already really engaged with our new topic "Ancient Civilisations", looking at Pharaohs, the river Nile and mummification. We hope to learn lots more about these areas and have written some questions in our English lessons that we hope to answer when exploring our topic further. In Science we have been looking at forces and magnets. On Wednesday we started to investigate how the surface material of an object can affect the speed at which it travels.

Badgers D - We have had a very busy start to the term. We have been quizzing on the books we read over Easter; exploring animal adaptations in our whole class reading, understanding the Christian symbols of Easter (including hot cross buns!) in R.E. and having some hands-on Maths by exploring and reviewing our prior learning of fractions.

Badgers H - We've come back with a bang in 4H and got straight into teeth and digestion. We've been identifying and naming the different teeth in humans and comparing their shape, size and function with carnivores and herbivores. We've also explored the journey of food from first bite, through the human digestive system, which was fascinating!

Foxes - We have been extremely busy during our first week back. We have unpicked tricky vocabulary in Rudyard Kipling's classic 'The Jungle Book', explored volume in maths and discussed salvation in RE. However, a particular highlight was our science investigative work linked to forces. To understand how gravity and air resistance work, we explored how paper helicopters descend at different rates according to the surface area of their blades.

Otters - It has been lovely to welcome all of the children back following our Easter break. It has been a week of consolidation in Year 6, focusing on the things we can do really well to make sure we feel confident. We have reminded ourselves of percentages and honed our reasoning skills in maths lessons. We have also tackled some tricky SPaG and been very successful. PE this week was a great chance to let off some steam. We practised our throwing and catching skills with a dodgeball and benchball tournament! Even Mrs Parker joined in!

Construction Challenge - 100

Last term, we set a friendly construction challenge to build a supercar. The Year 6 judges set the challenge for this half-term which is to build a tree house. The first entry, from Leon, has set the bar really high and children can check it out as it is already on display. I am now looking forward to receiving more entries. Please note that the display unit shelving imposes a height restriction of no more than 34cm. I hope that there will be room in next week's newsletter for a photograph to whet the appetites of other possible competitors!
