KS1


This week in History Hedgehogs looked at timelines. We ordered decade word cards and counted up and down the timeline to help the children to become familiar with the names of each decade. We then used the timeline to discuss how much time has passed between 1950 and 2015. We discovered that decades are 10 years and that a lot has happened since 1950!

In Geography, we shared the book 'Here We Are' by Oliver Jeffers and 'How to Make Apple Pie and See the World' by Marjorie Priceman. We used these books as a starting point to discuss the subject of geography. We found out that geography helps us to learn about the world and its people. We discovered that the world is made of physical and human features. We named and described each feature and sorted the features into either human or physical features.eg 'a bridge is a human feature that helps people to cross a river.

In maths this week, Squirrels have been looking at the composition of numbers. We have been looking at different pictorial representations of numbers and talking about how we can use the patterns to create number sentences. We have been using part whole models to create number sentences and to understand the different parts of the number sentence. We understand that the equals sign does not mean 'makes' but it means 'is the same as.' We are beginning to explore fact families and the commutative law where a number sentence can be written in a different order but still mean the same thing.

Rabbits have had a busy first week back at school! We have enjoyed Forest School, PE and making our very own Bell Beaker Pots. These pots have been carefully designed using a variety of natural tools to help create the repeating patterns. Bell Beaker Pots were created in the Bronze age, used as a tool for drinking by men at feasts and so sacred that men of high importance were buried with them! We are looking forward to finishing our pots.

There has been some wonderful creativity in Badgers D this week as we have been looking at Contrast and Complement in our Art lessons. We have expanded our knowledge and understanding around the colour wheel and colour theory. It was lovely to have some time experimenting with watercolours in our sketchbooks and annotating our pages to describe our colour work. We have also been looking at sample work of famous artists, discussing their use of colour and how this affects the viewer.

Random acts of kindness

Badgers H took Mr Culley at his word this week when I received an unexpected invitation - join them for lunch!! It was such a lovely act of kindness and I wasn't really sure what to expect, but it was a lovely chilled, chatty half hour and I can't wait to do it again. Thank you 4H for being so very kind.

This week in Foxes we have been working on Gattengno-Charts in Maths. We have been practicing doing 'more or less'. In computing, we have been researching how to take care of animals. Some of the animals included a tiger, a Koala and a dragon! In English, we have been focussing on persuasive writing using the story of the Island of Neverbelieve.

We have been busy scientists in Year 6 this week! We have been classifying living things into different groups. Did you know that a whale is a mammal even though it lives in the sea? Did you know that a worm is an annelid, not an insect? We also explored different types of leaves we might find in Britain and classified these using a Venn diagram. Some organisms are so small you can't see them without a microscope - we were amazed to learn that bacteria are all around us and even on our bodies!
