Hedgehogs Class


This half-term, Hedgehogs have welcomed Liz Mitchell to Mrs Payne's class.

Squirrels Class


This half-term has been very busy as:-

Rabbits and Badgers Classes



We went to Butser Ancient Farm to help study parts of our topic, The Stone Age. We were met by a lovely lady, Wendy, who was our expert for the day.

We made camp in a Stone Age roundhouse - there was a fire in the middle of the house to help keep us warm. We did a selection of activities to help

us understand the way of life in the Stone Age. We had to do some wattling - weaving hazel wood for the fences. We had to work in pairs to do this to make sure we did it properly.

We also did some wool spinning with sheep's wool (it was smelly and felt disgusting). It was quite difficult to do as the spinner had to always be spun the same way otherwise it would undo the spinning.

We also did some chalk carving - we had to

carve with sharp flint and could only make the colour using a dock leaf. Our final activity was archaeology where we had to dig to find some bones and flint. We also had to match the pieces we found with an actual artefact. We had to use toothbrushes to help clean each item.



We had a visit from Paul Ulson to conclude our topic on The Stone Age. Firstly, we did some role play to help us understand the timeline between the Stone Age and Iron/Bronze Ages. The Stone Age lasted the longest period of time and was over 3.5 million years ago.

Badgers and Rabbits had made shields in preparation for Paul's visit. We split into two groups ready to stage a fight. There was lots of chanting going on to show respect to the leading gods/goddesses. There wasn't a clear winner so two champions had to fight it out and the losing one had to have his head cut off (as a sign of respect - it was shown to his team). The battle was

also shown to our parents later on.

We also tried some Ogham writing (also known as the Tree Alphabet) - it was a code that was never cracked by those trying to read messages being sent between priests. We all wrote messages to our parents/carers for them to decode when they came in for our Fantastic Finish.

Finally, we drew some artefacts with chalk and had to look carefully at the light and shadows. These were shared with our parents/carers in the afternoon. At the end of the day we also had a quiz between parents and pupils and luckily the children won! By Ivy and Sophie
