A WORD FROM THE HEAD

8th October 2021

At the start of the week, we had our first visit from a West Sussex official monitoring the need for a traffic crossing. The feedback is encouraging and suggests our case is a strong one. She will return in the near future, so please continue to walk to school or park and stride when you can.

This week, it feels a little as though the children are taking over! On Tuesday, the Year 5 pupils led their weekly class acts of collective worship, with the subject of interfaith, using the inspirational story of a Catholic Church whose parishioners opened up their cloisters during the COVID restrictions to enable Muslim neighbours to come together to eat during Ramadan. The next day, our Year 6 school councillors attended remote training with school councillors from other local schools. Their first project is to revive the school's Playtime Leader scheme where older pupils organise playtime games for the younger children. Today, our Rights Respecting Schools Ambassadors have held a socially distanced cake sale for Refugee Action to support refugees from Afghanistan. Meanwhile, our house captains have booked an assembly before half-term to explain to the rest of the school how their new Daily Mile initiative might work.


Poetry Recitation Competition

volunteering. Young people must be accompanied by an adult and can volunteer for as long or short of a time within the 4 hours as they wish.



We have used the symbols < (less than) and > (greater than) to compare these groups. Towards the end of the week, we also worked on ordinal numbers. The Grandparents were treated to tea and cake before coming to the classroom, looking at the children's work and having their portrait drawn. The children had spent the week thinking about questions to ask them and writing them down with perfect punctuation. We also talked about good questions which need more than a yes or no answer. Eliza, Harriet and her brother Rory (in Hedgehogs) did a wonderful job of helping Mrs Bennington show the grandparents to the correct classes. The grandparents had a wonderful time and asked if they could do it again soon!

KS₂

We have had a fantastic Science Week in Rabbits looking at light and how shadows are created. We have enjoyed making puppets and using light sources (torches) to experiment with how shadows change depending on how far or close they are to the light source. We have also spent time recording our results in bar graphs!

Sunshine, excitement and apples galore! That was 4H this Wednesday afternoon as they harvested the fruit in the School Orchard. Our plan is to make Christmas Apple Chutney, which the children will prepare and cost up themselves, to sell at the Christmas Fair. We will also be selling Easebourne Crab Apple Jelly, which Mrs Taylor's Cooking Club are making – again using our own fruit.

This week, 4D have been continuing their learning of States of Matter by looking at evaporation, condensation and The Water Cycle. There were lots of super scientific experiments where we tried to figure out where our wet handprints went, how water can get on the outside of a sealed glass jar with ice in it and created our own mini water cycle. We also learnt that all the water on our planet is recycled - so the water we drink is the same water the dinosaurs drank.

This week, we have had a busy week in Foxes. We have been learning all about counting in tenths in maths and got to use lots of manipulatives to show our thinking. Science has been really fun because we have been looking at the phases of the moon and checking at night to see what has changed. We also planned and wrote a shared poem in English... we hope to perform to one of the younger classes next week!

Our week started off a bit gory: Y6 made our own blood! We used water to represent plasma, gelatine to represent platelets and red food colouring to represent red blood cells. We have been working hard to learn more about the circulatory system, blood vessels and the heart. In PE, we have been working on our hockey skills and have already greatly improved our passing and dribbling! We have been self-assessing and decided we now need to work on moving into space when playing matches.
