A WORD FROM THE HEAD

Welcome to 2022 - Christmas seems a long time ago now and Santa's Grotto (see News story) a distant memory! It was lovely to see everybody back and the school term started with real excitement.

COVID-19 remains a key concern. I hope you have all received the school's revised risk assessment. You will have read that we continue to use ventilation as a key means to reduce the risk of

infection in school. This means that the recent cold weather outside has inevitably led to a cold snap inside as well over the last two days. I would therefore ask parents and carers to ensure that their children come in wearing sufficient layers to stay warm, without the need to keep their coats on in classrooms. We understand that these layers may not fit with the school colours, but would ask that they are plain in colour, ideally avoiding designs.

From Tuesday 11th January, confirmatory PCR tests following a positive LFT are to be temporarily suspended. People who receive a positive lateral flow test result will be required to self-isolate immediately and won't be required to take a confirmatory PCR test.

Finally, can I ask parents/carers not to send children in with the new misting water bottles. I can see that these are ingenious devices and would be really useful in a range of situations, but they are not very helpful at school where the temptation to mist is often too great to resist. Thank you for your understanding.

It was great to see Hedgehogs back in the New Year and hear all their news from Christmas. We are doing lots of practise using full stops and capital letters this week and used these to write our stories of the Three Little Pigs which we will be continuing next week.

We are starting to learn about Judaism and in particular a Mitzvah which is a good deed. We acted out the story of Zoe and her Grandpa with some great acting skills from our volunteers. They helped tell the story of how important good deeds are in the Jewish faith and how Zoe visited her grandpa when he was ill and cheered him up. We started looking at our new DT and science module and learnt about different food sources and where food comes from. We matched up some pictures into groups of either plant or animal source. During science we looked at shade and shelter to see what materials make a good shelter. We further investigated this by taking a walk around the school grounds and finding different shelters.

In PE, we pretended to be crabs and practised galloping sideways and changing directions, we also pretended to roll down sand dunes, learned about log rolls and teddy bear rolls. 
