
The Mysterious Door

Red Nose Day

Red Nose Day is on Friday 15^{th} March. We are currently selling Red Noses at Reception, before and after school, costing £1.25 each. This year there are 11 different noses including the rare 'Hoppy Hooter' and the ultra-rare 'The Transforminos'. Children are welcome to wear their noses to school on 15^{th} March. We would recommend you use a marker pen and mark your child's Red Nose with their initials.

Paired Reading Workshop

Parents are invited to a paired reading workshop on Wednesday 20th March at 2.45pm. Paired reading is a research-based fluency strategy used with readers who lack fluency and helps to encourage a love of reading.

Come and find out more about this simple but effective approach when reading with your child.

Paired reading - what are the advantages?

- Increased enthusiasm: children are encouraged to pursue their own interests in reading material.
- Lots of praise: pupils are told when they are doing well, instead of only errors being highlighted.
- Emphasis of understanding: not just mechanically reading, but getting the meaning out of the words on the page.

No failure: it is impossible not to get a word right within 5 seconds or so. With paired reading it is easier for children to make sensible guesses at new words, based on the meaning of the surrounding words.

- Children are encouraged to read with expression and the right pacing.
- Children are given a perfect example of how to pronounce difficult words.
- There is some evidence that just giving children more attention can actually improve their reading.

"Thank you" to all those who donated cakes for our sale at the end of last term. We raised £50 which will be put towards purchasing cooking equipment for the children to use at cooking club and during class cooking sessions.

Race Night is on 22nd March at Memorial Hall, Midhurst at 7pm. Please ensure you book your tickets as soon as possible as numbers are limited (forms and ticket request box on reception). Due to catering etc. we have to make a decision if it's going ahead or not by Monday 11th March so you don't have long. A reminder of how the evening will work - Tickets cost £15 each and include a hot meal. You are invited to buy a horse for £10 (note you do not have to do this). If your horse wins its raise, you will receive a £40 return. Alternatively, just come along for an evening's fun with friends with a little bit of betting money for the totes and the bar. There are 6 real horse races which are projected up on a big screen, so it's just like going to the real thing except indoors in a warm room!
