It was lots of fun trying to act like Tom who is a grumpy 60-year -old man! On Tuesday, Foxes presented assembly to the rest of the school. In groups of 5, we visited different classes and explained some hard-hitting photos of refugees. Although some of us felt shy to present, we grew in confidence once we got started.

On Wednesday, Otters were delighted to go and visit Midhurst Rother College. We were shown around the school by some very helpful students who answered lots of our questions. We were split into groups to take part in some awesome secondary school lessons: science, English, maths and team building. A few of us even managed to complete the maths challenge and complete the cube! Team building was a great opportunity to think creatively and work with children we haven't worked with before. We had a great day and are feeling more prepared for secondary life.
